The LHS is for all local people with housing need and those seeking to live in the Angus area. It will also set out how the Council and partners intend to meet housing need and demand across all tenure in Angus, setting out a clear strategic vision to:

- Improve housing affordability
- Increase access to a range of housing options
- Increase access to specialist housing provision
- Prevent homelessness
- Create sustainable communities

A set of evidence papers have also been developed to support the development of the proposal, these cover: Housing Delivery and Placemaking, Specialist Housing and Independent Living, Fuel Poverty, Energy Efficiency, House Conditions and Climate Change and Preventing and Addressing Homelessness.

HNDA Stakeholder events were held in May 2021 and December 2021 to ensure that external partners and stakeholders were given the opportunity to scrutinise, feedback and support the development of the HNDA evidence base.

Prior to community engagement we undertook a number of stakeholder engagement sessions from late 2020 to mid-2022. Four sessions were held covering the topics of the evidence papers and a further 2 Housing Need and Demand sessions. These focussed on engagement around what stakeholder thought the main issues in Angus were and what action we should take. Attendees included Developers, Land Owners, Registered Social Landlords and representatives from NHS, Angus Council, Health and Social Care and the Third Sector.

The Tayplan HNDA (2013) has helped measure the extent of housing need and demand in Angus. Housing and related data available from the Scottish Government and partner institutions.

We have consulted with a wide range of partners, people and communities to help develop our LHS. We used a range of methods, from face-to-face meetings and group discussions in the period prior to the pandemic, before hosting a series on online events and developing surveys to gather views and feedback. Each time we utilised web and social media platforms to communicate our plans far and wide and capture a significant audience-base.

A wide range of consultation surveys and engagement sessions were carried out over the period 2018 to 2022. The volume and range of consultations outlines the Council's hands-on approach when engaging with our service users and communities about housing and related matters. The responses enabled us to shape and adopt local policies and initiatives based on the needs of local people and stakeholders, considering the shifting priorities in people's everyday lives as a consequence of the pandemic, and the national approach outlined in Housing to 2040. The continuous programme of engagement has served to provide a solid evidence base for LHS consultation and development.

Age

Impact

Positive impact, the proposal identifies housing for older and young people as a priority. Throughout the LHS topic papers we have addressed the cross-cutting themes relating to child poverty. The strategy also focuses on increasing the housing options for older people with specialist housing requirements.

Disability

<u>Impact</u>

The proposal identifies housing for people with disabilities as a priority, such as targeting resources to assist people to live independently in their own home, increasing the volume of accessible homes and improving access to housing adaptations. Housing options for those with health or mobility issues should be increased and made available in the area they want to live. The LHS delivery plan will contribute to the assessment of the current and future housing needs for health and social care client groups. Having a home where people feel physically, socially, and emotionally secure is imperative for health and wellbeing.
