# FAMILY, EDUCATION AND JUSTICE COMMITTEE - 15 AUGUST 2024

#### INTERIM PERFORMANCE UPDATE - ANGUS ADVOCACY STRATEGIC FRAMEWORK

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#### 1. ABSTRACT

This report provides an update to the Family, Education and Justice Committee on the progress of the Angus Advocacy Strategic Framework.

### 2. ALIGNMENT TO THE COUNCIL PLAN AND COUNCIL POLICIES

This is aligned to the Angus HSCP Strategic Commissioning Plan (2023-2026) and direction by The Mental Welfare Commission.

The Framework is aligned to the Angus Community Plan and Angus Council priorities of Caring for our People:

- We will reduce inequalities in our communities.
- Improve physical, mental health and wellbeing.
- We will protect those in our communities who are at risk of or have experienced significant harm.

#### 3. RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that the Family, Education and Justice Committee

- (i) Acknowledges the progress of the delivery plan within the Angus Advocacy Strategic Framework since its approval in February 2024; and
- (ii) Requests a further update report in 12 months' time.

#### 4. BACKGROUND

- 4.1 As directed by The Mental Welfare Commission, each HSCP and local authority are advised to have a plan outlining the available advocacy services as instructed through several pieces of legislation.
- 4.2 For example, the Mental Health (Care and Treatment) (Scotland) Act 2003 imposed a duty on local authorities and health boards to collaborate to ensure the availability of independent advocacy services in their area for those with a mental disorder (children, young people and adults). A mental disorder is defined as:
  - any mental illness
  - personality disorder
  - learning disability
- 4.3 Separate to the requirements introduced by the 2003 Act, the local authority also has a duty as an Education Authority to provide advocacy services available for children subject to discussion in tribunal proceedings under the Education (Additional Support for Learning) (Scotland) Act 2009.
- 4.4 Furthermore, in accordance with article 12 of The United National Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC), every child has the right to say what they think in all matters affecting them, and to have their views taken seriously. This expectation is translated into Getting it Right for Every Child and was given legal effect in relation to the Child's Plan through the Children and Young People (Scotland) Act 2014 section 33. Independent advocacy is one mechanism through which children and young people (as well as their families) can exercise this right. The

Framework summarises a range of services in place to support children, young people and families in Angus to access the advocacy that is right for them.

- 4.5 The Carers (Scotland) Act 2016 requires each local authority to establish and maintain an information and advice service which must provide information and advice in respect of advocacy for carers.
- 4.6 Work initially began in 2018 to develop an Advocacy Framework for Angus (for children, young people and adults) however progress was delayed due to operational pressures as a result of the COVID-19 pandemic. Progression recommenced in August 2022 and the Angus Advocacy Planning Group was reconvened with refreshed membership from:
  - Angus Health and Social Care Partnership
  - Children, Families and Justice, Angus Council
  - Community Mental Health and Wellbeing Services, AHSCP
  - Angus Independent Advocacy
  - Angus Carers Centre
  - Parent to Parent
  - Who Cares? Scotland
  - Procurement, Angus Council
- 4.7 In February 2024, the Angus Advocacy Strategic Framework was approved by both the Angus Council's Family, Education and Justice Committee and the Angus Integration Joint Board (AIJB). It was requested at the Family, Education and Justice Committee that an update on progress be given at a further meeting in August 2024. Thereafter, it was agreed that the same update would be provided to the AIJB and the AIJB Strategic Planning Group.

#### 5. CURRENT POSITION

5.1 The Advocacy Planning Group meet every two months. Since the approval of the Framework in February 2024, the Group met in February, April and June. At each meeting, the Group record progress of actions within the delivery plan of the Framework. Progress against the high-level actions through 2023-2026, has been summarised below:

	Angus ADP gathered experiential feedback relating to the implementation of the MAT Standards from people accessing substance use services (12), their family, carers and nominated people (14) and staff working in substance use services (10). Feedback was thematically analysed within four categories: access, options and choice around treatment; staying in and being involved in treatment; shared care and advocacy; and mental health and emotional wellbeing. Some respondents were aware of advocacy supports and were engaging with local advocacy services but a small number were unaware of the services and felt they could benefit. Substance use services have updated their assessment paperwork to ensure offering and recording of advocacy discussions is undertaken. Referrals to advocacy services from substance use services is being recorded and monitored and we are required to report on this nationally as part of the annual MAT benchmarking assessment process.
